New Kinlochard village hall opens for business

The sun shone, the skies were blue, the loch sparkled and spirits were high for the opening of the new look Village Hall in Kinlochard.

"WOW" was the most frequently heard reaction as people stepped inside. Architect John White's clever designs with the glass frontage, refurbished old hall and new additions make full and fantastic use of its stunning lochside location.

This wonderful new facility is the result of a lot of hard work, good will and generosity by funders (see below), fund raisers, professionals, builders and folk from near and far, many of whom joined the celebrations.

Over 200 friends, supporters and those directly or indirectly involved, gathered to celebrate what had been achieved. The Kinlochard community turned out in force - from babes in arms to those over 90, and those who remembered the original Hall coming into being over half a century ago.

Kate Joynson officially opened the Hall and her husband Peter - whose family had donated the site in 1957 to the community - unveiled Toto McLellan's stunning wood carving. Both beautiful and intriguing, it shows Kinlochard and its surroundings, with lots of "hidden" details of flora, fauna and local history.

Winter Weather Response

The good weather may have (hopefully, temporarily) deserted us, but that hasn't deterred those couples choosing to be married in the area, as we enter a busier time



Thefts from Rural Properties

8th May 2011

On 5th May 2011, the property owner and another member of the public disturbed a male raking through a skip at The Barn at Port of Menteith. The male was asked to leave, but it was discovered after his departure that a log burner had been stolen from the property. The property owner was able to pass details of the vehicle used, and police have a positive line of enquiry to follow as regards this theft.

Whilst rural thefts are falling in number across the Aberfoyle area, it is important that members of the public remain vigilant and report any activity they deem suspicious to the police at the earliest opportunity to maximise the chances of catching any potential offenders.

5th May 2011

Police have been contacted regarding a suspicious vehicle in the Aberfoyle area. It is described as a blue and white tipper/flat bed Transit van. The occupants of the van appear to be carrying out 'reconnaissance' while asking property owners whether they have any scrap.

TIGHT TIMESCALE FOR FUNDING **CAMPAIGN**

We would like to take this opportunity to up-date the Trossachs Community on our proposal for a full-size outdoor Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) based at McLaren Leisure Centre. The Multi Use Games Area Project is a partnership between McLaren Community Leisure Centre. McLaren High School Parent Council and Stirling Council.

We would like to clarify that, contrary to previous press information, we have not secured funding for this project. A working group (McLaren MUGA Working Group -MMWG) has been established by the partners stated above and is charged with progressing the project. We are making a concerted effort working within a tight timescale to secure sufficient funds to bring this much needed and desired facility to Callander.

The total projected costs approximately £450,000 and whilst we have secured £70,000 from Stirling Council the Working Group is embarking on a major fundraising campaign and welcome any support sponsorships with match-funding businesses to realise this aspiration which will be a benefit to all in the wider community.

Summer is beckoning but work in Westminster continues apace. I have lent my support to the Fish Fight campaign, calling on Government to vote proposed against reforms of the EU

Common Fisheries Policy unless certain conditions such as the current policy of fish discards are met. Currently, EU boats in the North Sea have to throw away up to half of what they catch to stay within their quotas. As the mother of a fisherman I have welcomed efforts by my colleagues and also of TV chef Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall in bringing this waste of both fish and the fishermen's efforts to the public's attention.

Many of you have written to me expressing your dismay at the possibility that the government may reject the advice of the Committee on Climate Change regarding targets for reducing greenhouse gas emissions. I have made representations to Chris Huhne, the Energy Secretary to express the hope that should Mr Cameron wish to run "the greenest government ever" then he must take into consideration of my constituents concerns and mustn't water down the climate targets.

From global to local climate concerns ...at the time of writing this article, I am looking forward to opening the newly refurbished pond area at Trossachs Primary School in Brig O'Turk. The school was successful in receiving a Big Lottery Fund award that allowed them to install a pond dipping platform at the school pond and to build a decking area around it. I hope to use one of their special Pond Dipping kits when I am there and will keep you updated of my visit in the next issue!



National Park News By Owen McKee

How is it possible to feel disappointed when Bank Holiday weekends are blest with exceptionally good weather? Unfortunately we all know the answer. Along with the very many people who come to enjoy our beautiful area there are always some who have no respect for others or the countryside. I am always challenged when asked what the Park Authority is doing about it for in my heart of hearts I know only too well that unless we have Rangers or Police covering every spot 24 hours a day there will be problems. Operation Ironworks is making a big difference in reducing the mayhem but still we are left to clear up the mess left behind. We are more than grateful that we get so much voluntary help clearing up. Oh for the day when that willingly given help can be utilised to bring improvements to paths and the like instead of clearing up health hazards!! The Bylaws for East Lomond which will see the banning of wild camping in the stretch from Drymen to Rowardenen will come into force on 1st June. Borrowing from the experience of that exercise we will now be looking at what can be done in the area of Lochs Venachar, Achray, Lubnaig, Voil/Doine and Earn. Because of its proximity to the trunk road it is accepted that Loch Lubnaig is a priority and discussions are already taking place with the relevant land owners and community councils to try to put in place some facilities this year. Also we will shortly have a special Board Meeting to finalise our special pleading for extra funding to tackle the problem throughout the Park.

It is not all bad news. One area where voluntary help has produced a big improvement was in the building of the replacement bridge at the Barcklinn Falls in Callander. We have just heard that the new Bridge has been shortlisted in the nominations for the International Footbridge Awards. The other nominations in the category are from USA, South Africa, Portugal and England and the awards will be made at a gathering in Poland in June. I will let you know the result even if we don't win.

The Local Plan examination by the Reporter is progressing with final public hearing taking place in Callander on the 10th and 12th May. That hearing was concerned with specific proposals for Callander where there had been a number of objections to proposed housing sites and some long term proposal for tourism related developments. Both days were well attended and the Reporter gave the objectors the opportunity to question the Park Officers on the process and reasoning behind the Local Plan proposals. The Reporter will continue his examination of the Local Plan over the next couple of months, after which he will let the Park Authority have his views. With a little luck we will have a finalised Local Plan for the Park by the autumn



STEAMSHIP SIR WALTER SCOTT JOINS 'HISTORIC FLEET'

The Steamship Sir Walter Scott's place as one of the UK's most historically important vessels was marked last week by the raising of a new ensign bearing the mark of National Historic Ships' Historic Fleet. Launched in 1899, the Sir Walter Scott has been sailing Loch Katrine for over 100 years, taking countless visitors and tourists over the tranquil waters of one of Scotland's most breathtaking inland lochs. Today, it is believed to be Scotland's oldest passenger steamship still operating a regular service, with daily sailings available from Trossachs Pier near Callander from April to October.



The ship itself was constructed by Dumbarton shipbuilders William Denny who built what was then a state-of-the-art passenger steamer powered by cutting edge triple expansion steam engine by Paul & Co of Dumbarton.

Robin Denny, a descendant of the Denny family who build the steamship 112 years ago, returned to Loch Katrine last week to mark this latest accolade - and to assist the team in her ongoing maintenance. He also joined Operations Director Gordon Allan in unveiling a plaque commemorating the hard work of the many highly skilled professionals and volunteers who contributed to a major renovation and restoration programme in 2005-9 which secured the ship's future.

Gordon commented: "Robin is now a regular visitor to the Steamship Sir Walter Scott and he is a great supporter of all the hard work which goes into maintaining a grand old steamship like ours. You could say it's after sales service - more than 100 years on! For us, though, Robin represents a wonderful link to the people who, over a century ago, sat at a drawing board then began the long process of putting together every last nut, bolt, timber and mast before launching then transporting her up Loch Lomond and overland from Inversnaid to her home on Loch Katrine."

Both the new ensign and the plaque were arranged by Graham Ellis, a founding Trustee of the Steamship Sir Walter Scott Trust, the charity which owns and operates the ship. Graham added: "The continued existence of the Sir Walter Scott as an operational passenger steamship is down to the fantastic restoration work which was undertaken over the five winters between 2005 and 2009. During that period numerous highly skilled engineers, craftsmen and volunteers worked in all weathers at the Stronachlachar slipway, transforming the ship into the beautiful, comfortable vessel visitors enjoy today. This plaque marks their exceptional work, and their invaluable contribution to ensuring the future of one of the country's most historic vessels, and for the public to continue

to enjoy.'

Ospreys Return

The season only started on the 31st March but already Aberfoyle ospreys are have a rollercoaster of a ride! We had five different osprevs on the nest in three weeks. making it one of



the most sought after nests in the Trossachs.

Currently taking up residence on the nest is last year's "trouble maker" metal ringed bird and a new female who, unusually, is totally unringed. She is sitting on three eggs which were laid on the 23rd, 25th and 27th April. The incubation period for an osprey is approximately 37 days so we are expecting the eggs to be hatched round about the last week in June.

What else is there to see?

As well as the ospreys, we also have live cameras of barn owls and her chicks and red squirrels; a blue tit currently sitting on nine eggs and our new Trossachs Water Vole Project area. With lots to see and do, why not pop in to Wildlife Watch at the David Marshall Lodge soon?

Please answer these questions on the relationship between you and your dog.

- 1. Does Fido greet you with love and excitement when you come home?
- 2. Does he love to go for a walk with you and rushes out of the door when you are ready?
- 3. Does she bark and/ or jump at the door to tell you someone is there?
- 4. Does he get his dinner and go lie in his basket/bed to allow you to eat yours in peace?
- 5. Is she eager to go on her walks with you and is excited to get there quickly so she can play with you?
- 6. When you go into the garden does he love to go with you and is there before you sniffing and running about?

A domestic dog is a wolf in dog's clothing and as such is a pack animal. As you know, in all packs there is a pecking order. At the top is the alpha dog then below him are all the other members of the pack in decreasing order of rank. At the bottom are the young dogs and puppies. In a domestic situation the pack obviously includes the human members the domestic dog lives with and Fido is a member of that pack.

If you answered yes to any of the questions above your dog, in your pack, is the alpha dog! i.e. he is the leader!

He is also a very confused, stressed dog and I am sure you would rather he was a happy, contented dog.

Fido isn't stressed or confused I hear you cry, this is rubbish you shout. He is a loved and very happy dog you say.

Bear with me. Please read on and continue to answer the questions.

- 7. In your family is Fido allowed to do everything he wants?
- 8. Is she allowed to sit on your favourite chair and you have to sit somewhere else?
- 9. Does he lie on your bed and push you off?
- 10. Is she allowed to eat the choicest pieces off your plate?
- 11. When out for a walk on the lead does he spend ten minutes sniffing one spot whilst you wait for him?
- 12. Does she push you out of the way and steal your food off the table or cupboards?

If you answered No to any of these questions how can you do this to the ALPHA animal? HE is the leader, you are lower ranking; SHE makes all the decisions in the pack, you do as you're told; HE gets the choicest pieces of food you get the left overs; SHE chooses the best spot for sleeping you can find another place.

Now do you see that your dog is confused and stressed? In some situations he leads then in others he is told he is not allowed to lead and must do as you tell him. I am sure you want to now make your dog a happy woof and several easy steps can be taken to do this. The one stipulation to make this work is that EVERYONE who lives with this wee dog must be consistent with the new easy steps.

In your pack you are the alpha animal; you make all the decisions; you decide where everyone sleeps, eats, what they eat and how much; you choose the walks and how long and you greet the visitors and make sure all is safe for your family. To enable Fido to know where he stands in this new pack of his he must be made aware of the rules. In each of the situations above a method of putting Fido gently in his place and eventually making him a happier dog is outlined below.

- 1. When you come home or enter the room your dog is in she shouldn't greet you till you are ready. She is telling you, "Oh good you got home safely. I am so pleased. I have been worried about you going out without me to protect you. I am glad all is well." You are the boss; you can do as you like and can go out without her worrying about you being out of the pack, therefore she should wait till you have taken off your coat not scratch the material, put down the shopping not tear the carrier bags, taken off the office suit not cover it in hairs, moved into the room not cause you to fall over a wiggly dog. Easily solved! When you come in ignore her. Turn your back till she stops leaping about. No eye contact, not a word, keep your hands up in front of your chest. Then when the leaping, yipping, wiggling, scrabbling for attention has stopped go in and get ready to greet her. If the leaping starts again, turn your back and go through it all again. Won't happen straight away but happens very quickly if you are consistent.
- 2. When you go for a walk make him sit at the door till you are ready in your coat and boots; make him stay sitting till you open the door and go out. THEN let him come out. By rushing out in front of you he is the pack leader checking there are no dangers outside the house that would get you; he is keeping you safe.
- 3. When visitors come she can woof to let you know they are there and then go sit down as the pack leader (you) has now taken charge. Go through the same routine of ignoring her and your visitors must do the same. Does work but takes time and consistency.
- 4. NEVER feed him before you. Alpha animals eat first! If you are not due a meal no problem. Make his meal up and have a 'handful' out of his dish and let him see you eating it. Put a biscuit behind his bowl wherever it is made up and he will think you are eating his food. Make a great show of eating it in front of him. Turn round so he can see you. This is very important. Watch his face - a picture!! Then feed him.
- 5. You, the pack leader, take the rest of the pack on a walk. You check for dangers in front. The underlings DO NOT take you or check all is safe. If she pulls, stop. Say don't pull or wait or whatever and wait till she has come back to your side. Never pull against her .Then set off again. Might be only one step but if she pulls, stop and do it again. This can take ten minutes or more the first time for the rule to sink in but when it works it is wonderful. Future walks will soon be stress free for both. Once more consistency is the key and all family members must take part.
- 6. Going outside the door anywhere means you must go first as you check for safety not him.
- 7- 12 are obvious NOs and most can be sorted by using the rules above.

These easy, gentle remedies can make a big difference to your dog's peace of mind and make your life easier too. They are all carried out with no physical contact with the dog. No forcing him/her to do anything. They make the decision themselves because they don't get what they want until they do what YOU want them to. !

Inversnaid Reserve



This is both my favourite and least favourite time of year. It is my favourite because there is nothing quite like settling down to watch the black grouse knocking lumps

out of each other in the name of procreation. It is my least favourite because I have to get up at 3.30 in the morning to get to the reserve in time to witness the spectacle - but what a spectacle it is!

Male birds gather on 'leks' (display grounds), displaying furiously and chasing off weaker birds. Their bubbling call is punctuated with violent shrieks that reverberate around the glen. The Inversnaid lekking ground is relatively large and the birds tend to keep guite a few metres from each other. Some of the other leks in the area are much tighter with a lot more friction between the birds. However, no matter which lek you are at, you are bound to see birds squaring up to each other before coming to blows. If it happened at two in the afternoon, I have no doubt that it would be a major tourist attraction.

The perfect lekking areas do not happen by accident, rather by careful management of stock numbers and monitoring of vegetation. This is before you even consider the ground scrub required for their chicks, and tree cover for winter. With a bird as fussy as the black grouse, you cannot leave things to chance.

As for the number of males on our lek; it has increased by one for the second year running. It may not seem like a lot, but 'the trend is your friend' and we are delighted that we are continuing in the right direction. However, when dealing with small populations any disaster is usually a major one, so we will not be taking our eye off the ball just yet.

SNH welcomes increase in outdoor recreation figures

The news of an increase in the number of people in Scotland using the outdoors for recreation has been welcomed by Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH).

The latest results from the Scottish Recreation Survey run by SNH show that the number of Scottish adults visiting the outdoors for leisure or recreation at least once a week has gone up from 46% in 2009 to 48% in 2010.

Last year SNH launched its "Simple pleasures, easily found" campaign, which encourages people to enjoy nature close to where they live.

Richard Davison, responsible for SNH's people and landscapes programme, said: "This is great news. The reasons for the increase will be many and varied but we believe our work on encouraging more people to visit the outdoors and the excellent work being done by local authorities and many others is helping to inspire people to get outdoors. Even in towns and cities, people have great opportunities to explore green places near to home and enjoy good local path networks which is why it's important to look after them. Spending time outdoors is fun and very rewarding, and is a great way to improve your health for free."

Inchmurrin aims to be rhodo free in five years

The fight to tackle invasive species has opened a new front on Inchmurrin, at the south end of Loch Lomond, which it is hoped will be declared rhododendron free within five years.

One of the most virulent and widespread non-native plant species in Scotland, Rhododendron ponticum, poses a significant threat to habitats, the wildlife they sustain and to the regeneration of Scotland's forests.

Infesting about one third of Inchmurrin - a 115ha island, part of which holds SSSI designation – the rhododendron menace is a significant threat to the 75ha of ancient semi-natural woodland to be found there.

Dr Stephen Murphy, Forestry Commission Scotland's Rhododendron Project Officer, said:

"The presence of rhododendron on the island is really bad news because it poses a threat to the important Alder-Ash woodland, one of the best examples of slope alder woodland in the area.

"Previous control measures had met with some success but the only way to preserve the island's special habitats and forest is to completely clear it of rhododendron."

"With £80,000 of grant support from SRDP the owner will spend the next five years working to eradicate this problem plant and restore the island to a pristine condition."

A range of techniques will be used to tackle the rhododendron, including mechanical flail, hand pulling, cut, burn and stump treatment and foliar spray. Any regrowth will be sprayed.

Forestry Commission Scotland has worked closely with the owner, staff at Loch Lomond & the Trossachs National Park and at SNH, both to secure SRDP funding for the project and to draw up a project plan.

Dr Murphy added:

"Removing the rhododendron from the island will also mean that it cannot become a haven for plant diseases, such as Phytophthora ramorum, which have the potential to seriously impact upon Scotland's forests.

"This project illustrates that well-planned proposals, from land owners who are committed to tackling the rhododendron issue, can benefit from Scottish Government support."

RAFTING THE FORTH RIVER

During

conversation over the phone with my old pal Joe Oliver (a retired Head Gamekeeper) the subject of 'cruising down the Forth' on makeshift rafts came up where Joe described his exploits from Aberfoyle village to the Rob Roy Hotel at Braeval. It reminded me of a similar adventure when Jackie Orr and I were about 14 years old. We built a crude raft with four five-gallon drums for flotation and launched it from the Forth Bridge at Aberfoyle when the river was well and truly in spate and just about to burst its banks and flood the fields and threaten the main street. The raft floated well enough and, with no steering other than a crude paddle made from a plank, we sped down river. But as we approached the first bend we saw water boiling. The Computer took over our lives?

It is a worrying notion that, as the years go by. we are becoming more and more reliant on machines and gadgets to communicate.

As a first thought, how many of us can truly admit to getting through a complete day without checking our e-mails (a faceless ideal, it must be said, which is capable of creating behavioural mood-swings on the part of the recipients, depending on the content, or lack of)?

There is no question, the advancement of technology can be of immense benefit to certain sectors of the populace, particularly the housebound and disabled, and those in outlying locations. There remains a base fear, however, that the traditional art of conversation is in danger of being annulled, as a consequence.

It is an undeniable fact that we are fast approaching the point of becoming a colourless society, whereby it will be more preferable to stare hypnotically into a mobile phone and 'text' (with all its downsizing of the English language through abbreviations) rather than engage in direct speech. In addition, 'Facebook' and 'Twitter' could, in the large part, almost be described as covens for egotists.

Alarmingly, these forms of social networking are proving prone to misuse, and there are increasing cases of radical individuals being charged for unsavoury comments posted. Political and racial extremism is, sadly, well to the fore.

This would seem to suggest a fine line currently exists between freedom of speech and censorship. The problem being, that by time the messages have been

The Internet has also proved itself time and again to be a vehicle for many forms of deviants, and companies all too eager to offer a scam to the unsuspecting public. On a slightly more bizarre level, I have also read of an instance whereby a Japanese lady was actually charged, and imprisoned, for killing her partner on a Virtual Reality game programme.

Whilst its availability clearly opens up a spectacular wealth of knowledge, I fear we are setting dangerous precedents by becoming over-dependent on what is on offer. As a 'for instance', it will almost certainly lead to widespread health problems, as we get lazier and lazier by choosing to shop online.

As a result, advertising and distribution methods will eventually change beyond all recognition, as global concerns realise the opportunity now exists to close cost-effacing local retail outlets by way of introducing larger central warehouses.

In turn, this will reduce the need for skilled employees in favour of lower earning manual labour, who will probably be 'farmed' from outside the United Kingdom. This 'knock-on' effect will almost certainly then have a profound impact on small businesses and employment levels in rural areas.

I despair at the lack of forethought and willpower, in terms of our general clamour to acquire the latest communicative products, whatever the cost, which, if we are honest about it, are basically designed to increase our social standing.

'The Laptop Generation', for example, are in danger of becoming a secular breed, seemingly living in mortal fear that someone would dare to avert his or her gaze from the screen by way of polite conversation.

The behavioural patterns of some mobile phone users (whose numbers, it would appear, now include everyone on the planet), also leaves a lot to be desired. As their chosen dialling tone rings, there is often a pause before answering, just enough time to make everyone in the vicinity aware of their importance: that someone is trying to reach them. This is generally followed by a striding out procedure and talking in a very loud voice, altogether woven by a peculiar and utter denial of their surroundings.

Immediately prior this to communication becoming widely available to the masses, companies actually employed individuals to frequent public places, and answer the phone on an ongoing basis. Of course, there was no one at the other end of the line: marketing at its best, or worst. I leave you to decide.


It is patently obvious that the mobile phone can be an extremely useful tool in the case of emergencies, but to most of us, it remains but a status symbol.

Another thing... how many of us, I wonder, now bother to take the time to write a letter, or send a postcard to friends, or loved ones?

In the recesses of my mind I recall a quintessential advertising campaign on television by British Telecom many years ago. Its simple, but very potent message was 'It's good to talk'. It remains to this day a defining phrase.

Perhaps it is time we got back to basics.

The Garden

What a fantastic spell of weather we had in April - I'm sure we are all hoping that that wasn't summer! All the work you did in the garden then should be paying off over the next few months.

The last frosts must surely now be behind us so it's safe to put out all the tender annuals that you've been keeping under cover. Whether in the borders or in containers make sure they're well watered in. Hanging baskets too can be put in position if they have filled out sufficiently; if the liner is still a bit too obvious keep them undercover a while longer.

In the ornamental garden it's time to prune spring-flowering shrubs such as Philadelphus and Deutzia; if you leave it till later in the year you risk losing next year's flowers. Remove suckers from roses. Take a look at any variegated-leaved shrubs and prune out any shoots that have reverted to plain green. Perennials will be growing rapidly and hopefully putting on a great show; help the taller ones to look at their best by using canes or other forms of support - on a large scale letting them grow through netting is very effective. Then when the flowers are fading, dead-head to prevent energy being wasted on seed formation. Climbing plants may also need to be tied in and extra support wires put up for those that don't self-cling like clematis and honeysuckle.

When mowing the lawn the height of cut should now be down to the minimum you want for the year, and if you haven't done so already apply a granular feed/weed.

The vegetable plot is where there should be the most action over early summer, far too much to list everything here, with everything from sowing to harvesting to be done.

In general keep the vegetable beds well weeded, and the more developed the crops are ensure they get adequate water, particularly the potatoes and especially if you are growing in containers; lack of water reduces the crop and increases the potential for diseases.

Keep earthing up potatoes, plant out all the veg you've started in pots and sow salad crops little and often. When you're planting your tomatoes plant deeply enough to cover the stems up to the bottom leaves which will encourage more roots to develop; except for the bush varieties such as Tumbling Tom, keep pinching out the side shoots. Water very regularly especially when the fruits start to grow as irregular watering leads to splitting of the fruit.

Spur fruiting fruit trees should be summer-pruned now to maintain the shape of the tree, pruning back to a pair of leaves above the spur. When fruits are developing do not be afraid to thin out the crop; leaving all the fruit on runs the risk of either breaking the branches and/or ending up with loads of fruit that are too small. And put up netting to stop the birds stealing your

Watch out for mildew on currants and gooseberries and when you've finished harvesting, prune the bushes to maximize airflow through them.

Orchids: With the frosts over, now is the time to put any Cymbidiums outside for the summer. Place them out of the full sun and in July keep them completely dry; this should encourage flower spikes to be produced rather than just new leaves.

Bird care: Keep feeding the birds to encourage them into the garden; you may spend a bit on bird food but they'll repay you be eating plenty of unwanted bugs and beasties.

Whatever you do in the garden, make the most of the long evenings and take time to appreciate your work when it's done.



What excitement in Strathard. First of all we had fire engines, ambulances, assorted smaller vehicles and a helicopter, racing to Glengyle to put out a massive grass fire on the hillside. The family living in the Dhu of Glengyle had to be evacuated for safety, in case their house caught fire. Then, a few days later, an airambulance was scrambled to fly to Forest Hills, one of their guests having been taken ill. However, it all ended well, the fire was put out, the hotel guest did not need to go to hospital and was able to continue his holiday at Loch Ard.

The day had started quite quietly, Grandpa Otter taking the family on a butterfly watching expedition to Loch Katrine. We had made our way up one of the water board's aqueducts, arriving at Royal Cottage to see great plumes of smoke billowing towards Stronachlachar. The twins thought that a volcano must have erupted! Dad suggested that we swim over to the Black Isle, to get a much better view of the blaze. After a long dry spell the loch had dropped quite a lot, which is probably the reason that the water board would not let the helicopter scoop up water to put out the flames. Luckily they changed their mind before the fire reached the houses of Stronie.

Even the thrill of an inferno loses its impact and soon Katrine and Duke began to notice white butterflies flitting amongst the flowers, searching out sweet, nutritious nectar to feed on. This, if you remember, was the reason for coming to Loch Katrine in the first place. There are several species of white butterflies, all looking rather ghostlike, now you see them now you don't. The first pair were identified by Grandpa Otter as Green-veined White, never attacking domestic cabbages and quite harmless if they come into your garden. It will be the caterpillars of Large White and Small White butterflies that will happily munch through your garden brassica plants.

Next stop was the Portnellan graveyard and now the butterfly hunt was really on. Before long we had found a Mountain Ringlet, guite small and brown, with tiny black dots on orange wing flashes. This is truly a creature of the Scottish Highlands. Dad told us to watch carefully. Each time the sun disappeared behind a cloud, the Mountain Ringlet simply vanished, as if by magic, to re-appear as soon as the sun returned. Braeval, not to be outdone, discovered a Peacock butterfly as it checked out a stand of half-grown nettles. These large, beautifully marked butterflies always lay their eggs on stinging nettles. Look out for the large, psychedelic spot on each of the four wings, remarkably similar to the larger version displayed on the tail feathers of a real peacock. By this time the hillside opposite had been blackened to the skyline, the sun was dropping behind the Arrochar Alps and our visit to Loch Katrine was coming to an end. That had been a lot of excitement for one day.

It was very good of them, I thought, to care so much about the fabric of the building in these straitened times.

It must have sounded a little menacing because people gave me a funny look. I always think a bright smile never goes amiss, so I then gave everyone my very best of smiles. It too seemed to make people nervous. One lady even pulled her handbag closer to her, as if I were a prospective mugger.

Of course, some people did put in money, including one or two children, encouraged by their mother saying, "Go and give that to the nice lady", (nice lady, moi?), but on the whole it was a depressing time. As someone who cannot walk past anyone collecting without putting something in the tin, I was sure everyone else would be the same. Almost everyone who did give, gave, they said, because they knew what it was like to collect for charity.

Fame at last!

A remarkable phenomenon has occurred today: Aberfoyle has been mentioned on national radio! Was this perhaps the announcement of a forthcoming Royal visit to formally open the new community petrol pumps? Alas no: Aberfoyle was mentioned only in the dismal context of the road traffic news to warn motorists that yet again the road between Ward Toll and

Ballat crossroads will be closed with consequent long diversion and possible congestion.

How often then has the name of Aberfoyle been spread throughout the land? In the world of church hymn music at least, the village has one claim to fame. The Revd Clifford Davies OBE RN, the Rector of St Mary's between 1966 and 1978, and no mean musician, composed a hymn tune which he named 'Aberfoyle'. Although appearing in one or two Anglican hymn books, it has yet to be voted into the top ten of the BBC's 'Songs of Praise'

'The Railway Magazine' has been in print continuously for over a century as the authoritative voice of the railway industry. In September 1951, its correspondent, one M.D. Greville, came to the village to describe the railway for its readers. Did he have 'insider' information to come guickly and write before it was too late? The railway was to close the following month. Nothing specific is said about this, and yet the article hints darkly that 'trains from Glasgow on the Aberfoyle line run on weekdays only and are now less frequent than before the second world war'; that 'traffic to Aberfoyle is light' and that Gartmore Station had recently been closed. The author describes Aberfoyle station platform as 'being considerable length and the layout includes a runround for engine release. The goods yard and engine shed adjoin the passenger station. Of that miserable Highland clachan to which Sir Walter Scott brought Baillie Nicol Jarvie and Frank Osbaldistone for their meeting with redoubtable Rob Roy, little or nothing remains and Aberfoyle is now a bright and clean holiday resort standing on historic ground where the Highlands and Lowlands meet'

In 1951, memories of coaches, especially the horse drawn stage coaches that plied for tourist trade at the station would still have been relatively fresh. The article explains the reason for their provision 'Not long after the opening of the line, the North British Railway began to advertise this as a route to the Trossachs, in competition with the Caledonian Railway's route via Callander. This route never achieved the popularity of its rival, which had the advantage of passing Loch Vennacher and Brig O' Turk and largely following the course described in the opening stanzas of 'The Lady of the Lake'

The article is complete with a photograph of a small locomotive standing on the turntable outside the engine shed. The site of this turntable is of course still identifiable, but little else remains. I am most grateful to John Clow for the loan of this information. Just before the outbreak of the Second World War a reporter from the BBC took up residence at the Baillie Nicol Jarvie Hotel and interviewed a number of local people. The resulting programme was broadcast nationally: more anon perhaps.

Scottish deer consultation begins today

A public consultation begins today (11 May) on a new code for deer management in Scotland.

Anyone with an interest in deer management is being encouraged to give feedback on the Code of Practice on Deer Management, developed by Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH).

The purpose of the code is to help all land managers and land owners, whether in the Central Belt or the Highlands of Scotland, to manage deer sustainably. The code supports the current voluntary approach to deer management. The consultation runs until 1 July.

Andrew Thin, SNH chairman, said:

"Wild deer are an important part of Scotland's ecology, economy and culture. Deer are managed in certain parts of Scotland to protect crops, trees and protected natural areas, as well as to reduce road accidents. Deer stalking also provides a valuable source of income to many fragile rural economies throughout Scotland. Balancing these different objectives presents a real challenge."

The code provides guidance on how to manage deer sustainably and outlines the main environmental, economic and social actions associated with deer management. The code also sets out when SNH may intervene in deer management for the public interest.

SNH has developed the code with input from a range of organisations and people involved in land management. The code arises from the Wildlife and Natural Environment (WANE) (Scotland) Act, which was passed by the Scottish Parliament earlier this year.

Alastair MacGugan, SNH's wildlife management manager, said:

"I'd encourage anyone involved in managing deer to look at the code and let us know their thoughts. This guidance will help all of us to manage Scotland's deer sustainably in a cooperative way – so it's important we get input from all those involved to develop a workable and clear code."



Match Report

Strathclyde Police RFC 10 McLaren RFC 31

McLaren RFC clinched the SRU West League Division 2 on Saturday after a tense and challenging encounter against Strathclyde Police at Lochinch in Glasgow. McLaren went into the match knowing they needed to win by 16 points or gain any bonus point win to take the title from Paisley, a success that looked improbable after 3 consecutive defeats at the start of the season.

The McLaren team had a familiar line up, with experience in Gregor Harvey and Chris Crichton providing experience alongside Blair Craig in the front row. From the kick off it was clear that the Police would prove a greater challenge than the recent comfortable victory McLaren achieved in Dunblane. Early phases saw McLaren attempt to move the ball quickly and vary the attack, but any opportunity for a clean break was closed out quickly by the Police, or broke down by unforced errors on McLaren's part. This allowed an experienced Police team to settle into the game, and raised the voices of the already well spirited visiting Paisley team, hoping for an upset. This spurred the Police on and they capitalised on a defensive error to touch down and take the lead with an unconverted try.

McLaren regrouped and with the experience of half backs Ross and Scott Drummond they managed to steady things, clear lines and settle into a more structured pattern; this allowed centres Robin More and Fraser Graham to get their hands on the ball and threaten the Police backs. This opened the opportunity for McLaren's try of the day: the Police late in the game.

Fraser Graham, getting the ball deep inside his own half broke right and used his pace to round 3 defenders, cutting in under the posts, much to the delight of the travelling support, with Ross Drummond converting. However instead of capitalising on the try McLaren once again found themselves struggling for continuity, an opening for wing Martin Fisher saw the final pass forced and knocked on much to the wing's frustration. Shortly after, opposite wing Jamie Robertson was caught just offside, catching a Dave Millar clearance. Things just got worse as the Police crossed the line to nudge into the lead once again. Heading towards half time McLaren were working themselves steadily into the game with Adam More and Andrew Drummond winning ball in the back row; coupled with captain Callum Dykes the scrum was steadied and opportunities were starting to emerge. Chances saw Ross Drummond and Dave Millar come close, however it was left to Scott Drummond to create a gap from 30 metres and dive in under the posts. Ross Drummond converted to take McLaren in 14 -10 up at half time.

Half time allowed coach Kris Burney to bring the team together and target the two tries which were now essential. The second half started on the right note

with Fraser Graham squeezing over after McLaren gained clean ball. The conversion established a 21-10. The feeling on the touch line was that surely now McLaren would take a grip on the game and move clear, however the Police were once again resolute and competing for every ball.

As the second half continued McLaren rang the changes from the bench, losing the presence of vital second row Graeme Robertson to an injury, they steadily gained the ascendency, Blair Craig breaking well and Scott Drummond forcing the game from stand off. The game was now deep into the second half and McLaren were still short of the vital try, with nerves on the touchline very frayed. However the full McLaren side chased and harried, knowing time was running out. A scrum five metres out saw a real opportunity, and with a good solid scrum, Ross Drummond reached for the line but was just short. McLaren were not to be denied and it was Ross again who made it across the line from a short break on the next attack, much to the relief of the travelling support. With Ross converting and following up with a subsequent penalty, McLaren saw the game out winning Callum Dykes receives the West 2 Trophy from Bill McMurtrie from the SRU 31-10 and taking their first title since 2003.
