Aberfoyle Motors – Big Lottery Fund Bid Underway!



Retaining garage and fuel facilities in Aberfoyle is still a matter of concern for many local people, and the abandonment of the lottery grant application in 2007, when it seemed impossible to go forward despite much hard work, caused huge disappointment at the time.

However in the background the possibility of buying Aberfoyle Motors has continued to be explored by members of the community, and the good news is that Strathard Community Trust, which still holds some funding to assist with lottery bid preparation, has recently agreed to back a further full lottery bid by the community. This would involve a grant of up to £750,000, primarily to buy the garage and all its assets including the buses. We are applying under the *Growing Community Assets* category, and our initial outline application has recently been approved by the Big Lottery Fund. This is the green light to proceed with a full lottery bid, which we need to do as soon as possible. The reasons for retaining the garage and buses within the community have been well-recognised, and continuation of garage services and improving public transport are both main priorities identified in the recent Community Action Plan.

- Loss of fuelling facilities doesn't help local people or visitors, and would threaten services based in or near Aberfoyle which need a fuel supply.
- Aberfoyle Coaches has recently been developing more local bus routes, which is excellent news, particularly with the loss of all our Postbuses now confirmed.
- With garage and buses centrally located in Aberfoyle and owned by the community, other related services of benefit to the whole local area could be introduced.

A lot of issues outstanding after the previous bid attempt have now been resolved, but from the Big Lottery Fund's point of view a significant element missing the last time was the full involvement and support of the local community. We cannot go ahead with this project, no matter how promising it seems, unless there is a lot more evidence of community backing. Based on the feedback received on questionnaires back in 2007, this support does seem to exist, but we need to be able to prove that.

So we are running a ***BIG Garage Open Day*** on Sunday 26th October from 12noon to 5pm, and drop-in sessions during the following weeks in various locations. Those will give you the opportunity to support the bid in whatever way you feel you can, and to have a say and involvement in what the community could do if it were to own the garage and bus fleet.

The Big Lottery Fund will be interested to see if there is indeed local support, and may even pay us a visit on the 26th, when we are planning a lively event really worth attending. We're hoping it will be a real community day with music, refreshments, activities and competitions for children, so if you have any offers or ideas for stalls or activities, donations of raffle prizes, help with children's activities etc., we would be really pleased to hear from you as soon as possible (see contact details at the end).

So do please come along and:

- **find out more** about the Big Lottery bid.
- **tell us what you would like** to see happening with the garage and coaches.
- **volunteer your help and support** – we have a big task ahead and everybody will be welcome to join in.

• **have a look at the assets** we want to buy – we have chosen that day since most of the bus fleet can be on show, and you can also have a good look at the premises, including the workshop.

• **help to name the project** - the Big Lottery bid title is 'Aberfoyle Transport Resources Community Initiative' but we really need a better long-term name for the community company which would run the garage and coach business.

• **take advantage of some 'special deals'** on offer just for the 26th - we are working on these with Aberfoyle Motors, which has offered this as a contribution to our campaign, as well as opening its doors to host the event.

More details will be delivered to every household in the area before the 26th, but here are answers to some of the questions that have been raised most often recently.



Is a bid viable this time? Yes – the plan is now to buy both garage and buses and to run both for the benefit of the community. We have worked out a way to access more lottery funding compared to the last bid attempt.

Will the petrol be any cheaper? That will be one of our main targets – to get fuel prices down and quantities sold up, and to help stop unnecessary refuelling trips. How much would we have to put the petrol price down to make it more attractive to local people? Do please do come along on 26th October and tell us!

Why would we want a coach business? Many people may not be aware that Aberfoyle Coaches, as well as school runs, now also has three scheduled local bus runs, with a weekend evening service due to start shortly, and also provides various other community buses in the wider Stirling area. A community business would focus on continuing to meet local transport needs.

Why do you want me to be involved? The bid will go no further if there is not enough broad-based community support, so every expression of interest and offer of help by local individuals or businesses is

really important. That could just be telling us you support the idea of buying the garage, or offering your help with the Open Day or bid process, or by fund-raising. We need to raise 5% of the funding from within the community by way of loans, donations or contributions in kind.

Or talk to Ian Marshall (chairman of Strathard Community Trust), Ros Dingwall in the Post Office, or bid co-ordinator Fiona McEwan from Strathard Community Council.

And finally This will be your lottery bid, your garage, your buses. If local people don't back the bid it will not go forward. So if you are interested at all in retaining the garage, providing local employment and further developing useful community services, please do give your support to this last possible attempt.

RSPB Inversnaid

Autumn has started but with the dreich August weather, it appeared to start even earlier than usual. However, in a dry spell our moth and butterfly man Nick Cooke managed to discover dark green fritillary on the reserve and add this species to our already impressive list. A superbly marked butterfly, it is identified by the dark green underside wing.

The golden eagles have been showing well yet again. One Saturday, just as I was leaving the reserve, I spotted a pair opposite the Garrison. Following them on my homeward journey I managed to get great views through the telescope of the male when he landed on a rock, and then they continued up the length of Loch Arklet and went out of view over the hills. Having had the opportunity to view them for ten minutes, I travelled on only to find them coming down the hill east of the Arklet corner, the male leading the female and they were only 50 metres up and about 200 metres away from me. They crossed the road towards Loch Katrine when suddenly

the male took a quick turn and stoop to the right and the flash of the underside of his wings showed that he was on to something. Suddenly, there were a few feathers flying and I could not make out exactly what was happening against the bracken-covered hillside. Then a blackcock (male black grouse) came flying hard out of the area flying low against the hillside, crested the ridge, and disappeared. The male golden eagle then reappeared and flying slowly, flew up and turned with the female and they both nonchalantly followed in the direction of the blackcock. The following Tuesday it was the turn of the reserve stalker to have great views of TWO pairs of golden eagles over Beinn a Choin (he always has to go one better!).

The feral goats continue to stay high up on Stob an Fhainne, cresting the skyline now and again. The cooler autumn weather will bring them down and back to the woodland and in November it will be time to start monitoring them again. It will be interesting to see how many of the kids have survived the first few months of their lives.

Meadow pipits and chaffinches have started

to flock together, mistle thrush and blackbirds are already eating the rowanberries and an interesting observation was a fox scat full of rowanberries. It appears that like the pine marten, their digestive system is unable to cope with the fruit and am still wondering how a fox managed to harvest them in the first place! The swallows and house martens are gathering for their return journey south to Africa, some of the recently fledged young looking very bedraggled for such a long trip. As the hirundines (collective species name for swallows, swifts and martens) go south skeins of greylag, pink foot and Greenland white front geese will be coming down Loch Lomond to over winter in the area. Another of nature's superb displays will be the forthcoming red deer rut. If you wish to view the rut, pick a sunny still autumn day, park in the Garrison car park and listen – the roaring of the stags is truly fantastic, and with luck they should not be too far away. Who knows, you may be lucky enough to spot the stags and the golden eagles on the same day.

The Poker Tree Project..update

Since the last issue, the team have continued to make significant progress, despite the inclement weather. The 'brashing' work on the dead trees along the riverside stretch is finally beginning to bear fruit as we seek to open up new and exciting views toward Ben Lomond and The Forth Bridge from within the gardens. Great strides have also been made through discussions with a variety of contractors which has offered a clearer understanding of costing required for possible tree surgery, path work, stone and metalwork and bench/seating construction. If sanctioned, this would enable us to approach funding organisations with a degree of confidence, having a design plan, and projected figures, fully in place. Alongside this work behind the scenes, there have been major contributions from the community of late: to Charles Stewart jnr., of Bracken Hill Cottage, who offered the provision of his metal detector. This unusual (and expensive) instrument enabled us to confirm, and map out, the existence of the tramway track across the full length of the garden. Although this proved to be a highly rewarding exercise, sadly, there appeared evidence that the root system of the group of Lawson Cypress conifers in the north corner have distorted the line somewhat and

there is no way of telling the extent of the damage, as we have no thought to uncover, and restore the track at this stage of planning; to Duncan Mackay, of D. and D. Forestry, who, by an absurd piece of coincidence, stopped by carrying a mini-digger on a trailer at the precise moment we were setting about the nightmare conglomeration of azalea, bramble and sycamore roots in the central area. Duncan gave of his time freely - and a problem that may have taken a couple of weeks to resolve, with our borrowed and rusted tools, was taken care of within a matter of half an hour; to John Clow, showing admirable use of a chainsaw, and Diana Carmody, working some magic with a set of pruners; to Katy Freeman and Andy Malcolm, from the Forestry Commission, who presented valuable advice on wildlife habitation and path construction. Many thanks to all of these people who rolled up their sleeves and turned up at the site to help make a



difference. The most important breakthrough in the last month, though, was confirmation that ownership of the grounds is now officially attributed to The McLellans at Kirkton Farm. This knowledge clearly means a more tactile approach is now required from the team, and consent will now be sought before any considered major alterations take place. It will come as no surprise to those who know Toto McLellan, that she has given her blessing to the project, and that she shares our hopes that not only will the gardens become a central feature of the village, but that they will also offer an area of great beauty, designed for the enjoyment of all the community. As the season draws to a close, we are still seeking contributions of unwanted tools, in order to tidy up the grass areas and hedgerows before winter sets in. Ah, you've noticed the misspelling so I'll have to explain. The 'tail' referred to in the title refers to that of a dog, or dogs plural or, more literally, dozens of dogs, huskies to be precise. Every winter there used to be two, sometimes three, husky rallies in Aberfoyle Forest. It was a popular venue partly due to its central position and easy accessibility for many dog teams and their owners. Contestants were also made to feel welcome by the village shops, pubs and cafes, not forgetting the accommodation providers, all of which received a bit of a financial boost at what was always a quiet time of the year.

Sadly, all this came to an end some 4 years ago when widespread harvesting in the forest park took place and event organizers had to look elsewhere. It all changed, however, last winter when the Forestry kindly resurfaced one of the 'Dedicated' husky trails and there was a husky rally held over a February weekend in 2008. It was successful and enjoyed by all. It was hoped that this would continue into this winter but, unfortunately, it was not to be. The Dedicated trail will now be closed from sometime in the late autumn, due to tree thinning.

One husky event organizer (not me, I hasten to add) contacted the Forestry with a view to running a similar event this winter only to be told that there were no trails suitable. She said that this surprised her as there must be in the region of 70 miles of trails in the forest park, so now the organizers are now looking elsewhere.

Hopefully, this will just be a small break in the history of husky events in the Queen Elizabeth Forest and we can look forward to them starting up again by next winter.

Aberfoyle – an invasion hotspot!

For the second time in two years Aberfoyle has been put on the map for sightings of a rare bird. A nuthatch, a plump, sparrow sized woodpecker like bird, was caught recently in an Aberfoyle garden by local bird ringer Andy Simkins. Andy said, "I had set up mist nets in the garden, which is the standard way to catch birds so that they can be ringed then released, when I noticed an unusual bird fly into the net. I was tremendously excited to discover that it was a nuthatch."

Nuthatches at one time bred only in England and Wales, but in the early 1990s sightings were recorded for the first time north of the border. In 2005 breeding was confirmed for the first time in southern Scotland and sightings of this normally sedentary bird had spread northwards towards the central belt. Some experts have suggested that climate change is responsible for the invasion, with less severe winters resulting in more birds surviving, fuelling their invasion north into Scotland.

Andy continued, "When I checked my records I found that I caught my first nuthatch in an Aberfoyle garden almost two years ago to the day. To catch one of these birds this far north and west is highly unusual. As I have now caught two, it is quite possible we have at least one breeding pair in this area."

The British Trust for Ornithology has welcomed this invasion and is keen to discover how many of these birds are being seen in Scotland. A black eye stripe, long pointed bill, buff underparts, chestnut on flanks and blue-grey back and wings make it unmistakeable. Scam warning for mobile phone customers

Stirling & Clackmannshire Trading Standards Service is advising consumers to be on the alert for a scam involving insurance for mobile phones.

The scam starts when a consumer enters into a new contract for a mobile phone with many retailers now offer insurance contracts with their mobile phones. Fraudsters are targeting these customers by phoning up and claiming to be from the insurance company. They pretend to be offering additional cover at a heavily discounted rate, or else they will simply state that they are preparing the necessary paperwork, and need to confirm some details. They go on to ask for personal information, including credit card and bank account details. Needless to say, these fraudsters have no connection with the mobile phone retailers or any legitimate insurance companies. Customers in the Stirling Council area who have recently been taken in by these fraudsters have found that they subsequently remove significant sums

of money from their bank accounts, typically between £80 and £120.

Ewan McCormack, Trading Standards Officer explained: "Mobile phone retailers do not pass on personal information about their customers. Instead, these fraudsters rely on the fact that the airtime providers often release mobile phone numbers to retailers in blocks. If the fraudsters can identify a genuine number from a particular retailer, they can then dial a range of consecutive numbers using the same prefix, and hope that they will eventually get through to somebody. They will be able to make false claims about working in association with the retailer concerned."

Ewan McCormack, warned consumers not to be taken in by these fraudsters. He added: "Consumers should never give out any personal information, especially credit card and bank details, to anybody who makes an unsolicited telephone call. If the caller claims to be from a legitimate

organisation that you are already dealing with, take appropriate steps to verify that they really are who they say they are. Check your paperwork, and call them back using a number that you have already been given or which has been publicly advertised, for example on television or in a reputable telephone directory. Better still; ask them to confirm their request in writing. Legitimate organisations will rarely ask you to disclose personal information over the telephone, so be wary if you receive such a request."

Any person who receives a suspicious telephone call should contact the police or their local Trading Standards Service. Isn't it strange? The big topic this month is a Public Toilet.

Time and time again I get the grumble that there is a complete lack of toilet facilities around our lochs. We are hoping that at long last there is a solution in sight. As some of you will know, the Park Authority is working in collaboration with Glasgow Caledonia University in a project called "Kit out the Park". During a discussion concerning the availability of shipping containers someone queried whether these could be converted to toilets. And so thoughts ran to solving the toilet problem. Knowing only too well that Local Authorities throughout the land are trying to close public toilets we knew that maintenance/cleaning were bound to be problems; so in deciding to trial a couple of toilets we focused minds on how we could reduce these. First we had to find suitable sites where there would be a need - that was the easy bit - and thankfully the landowners were very co-operative. Site one is at the head of Balquhidder Glen at the Inverlochlarig Car Park used extensively by hillwalkers. The other is at Strachur where divers at Loch Fyne will be the main users.

With sites arranged the next stage is costings so that we can start the search for the necessary funding. The funding task

is being taken up by the Community Development Trusts. There are ongoing discussions as to the maintenance and cleaning requirements. We think we have a solution for the trial period but only time will tell whether it will work in the long term. What's involved and how does it work? It is a composting system. A chamber is positioned below ground level, all encased in concrete and therein will be placed two removable toilets. The unit, constructed from a disused metal shipping container, is bolted on top. Once a year the unit will be unbolted and lifted off. The used toilets will be extracted and new ones inserted. The toilet block will then be replaced and bolted down. The overall unit will be Disability Discrimination Act compliant and flooring will be anti-slip. A rain water collecting tank will be built into the roof for cleaning purposes and gel will be available for hand cleaning. I can already hear the cries of anguish. We don't want the beauty of the area spoiled by ugly shipping containers even if they are to serve a much needed service. Fear not they will be clad in wood and the designs I have seen are very attractive indeed. Another feature is that they will have solar panels - possibly remotely positioned on a pole - to provide lighting.

If all goes well we hope to have the trial toilets in place for Easter 2009. Wish us

luck. It would be a major success if we could roll them out throughout the Park The Local Plan. Yes it is progressing and we are on target to issue the Draft Plan in November. You may recall that throughout the Park we had a series of Local Plan Open Days where the Park communities had the opportunity to say what they would like to see in - or excluded from - the Park Local Plan. We gathered together everything raised at those meetings and summarised them in an Issues Report which we forwarded to each of the Community Councils in the Park for comment. Of the 21 Councils in the Park 7 replied. To make sure that there is as much community input as possible to the Local Plan we will be having a special meeting to which every single community councillor in the Park is to be invited so that they can see what is being proposed prior to the issue of the Draft Plan. The official consultation period for the Local Plan will run from the date of issue in November and EVERYONE will be entitled to make comment thereon.

Have Your Say on National Park Nature Conservation Plan

Loch Lomond and The Trossachs National Park Authority has launched a Biodiversity Action Plan that aims to conserve and enhance the wildlife in Scotland's first National Park. The draft National Park Biodiversity Action Plan launched today (Monday 15 September) will be available at National Park offices and in all local libraries as part of the six week consultation for people to read and offer their opinion on the proposals. It has been produced by the Park Authority working in partnership with Scottish Natural Heritage, Forestry Commission Scotland, RSPB Scotland, SEPA, Woodland Trust Scotland, Scottish Rural Property Business Association, Scottish Agricultural College, Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group and local authorities.

The plan is the first of its kind covering the whole of the National Park and aims to make Loch Lomond and The Trossachs the location of choice for leading edge work to conserve and enhance Scotland's biodiversity. It brings all the partners together to deliver significant conservation initiatives including otter monitoring, golden

eagle viewing sites, sub-montane scrub restoration, the control of invasive plants, actions to protect threatened populations of red squirrels and native woodland work including the Great Trossachs Forest project which will eventually create 4,400 hectares of new native woodland.

Speaking about the Biodiversity Action Plan, Fiona Logan, Chief Executive, Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park Authority said: "This Biodiversity Action Plan is fundamental to the National Park making a difference to our environment. The plan is a core part of delivering on the Scottish Government's strategic priorities for the nation, in particular the commitment to a Greener Scotland and our own National Park Plan.

Anyone with an interest in wildlife and habitats in the National Park should get involved in this consultation and have their say about conserving this truly stunning part of Scotland for future generations to enjoy."

As part of the consultation, Alan Bell, Ecologist with the Park Authority will hold four surgeries at Carrochan, the National

Park HQ in Balloch on Tuesday 7 October; the National Park office in Callander on Thursday 9 October, the National Park Visitor Centre in Luss on Tuesday 14 October and the National Park office in Lochearnhead on Thursday 16 October. The Plan, accompanying Environmental Report and consultation response are available from the National Park website www.lochlomond-trossachs.org.

CROSSROADS - CARING FOR CARERS


For over twenty-seven years, Crossroads (West Stirlingshire) has been providing respite care for carers in the large rural area of West Stirlingshire.

This service was started by a group of volunteers. The group developed into a Board of Directors who until recently managed the service, employing a co-ordinator, office staff and care attendants. However, difficulty in recruiting volunteer Board members willing to take on this responsibility led to the Directors opting to transfer management to the national parent body, Crossroads Caring Scotland.

It is important to emphasise that the service to carers will remain unchanged; the employment of care attendants will continue; the local office will still be based in Balfour and co-ordinated from there. The sources of funding will be as before: part from Stirling Council, part by grants from charitable trusts and part from donations and fundraising.

In order to provide support to the local service, and also to influence the wider work of Crossroads Caring Scotland, a Crossroads Forum has been set up locally. A key element of this is fundraising, which has been so successfully coordinated in West Stirlingshire in the past. Additional activities might include recommending how to use locally raised monies, liaising with local organisations to stimulate donations, applying for grants, receiving feedback from the local service and assisting with the recruitment of staff.

Contamination Costs Council



The contents of Stirling's brown bins are causing concern as some residents are filling them with an array of rogue items that are not compostable.

Black bags of rubbish, plastic sheeting, extension leads, plastic wading pools and cement blocks were clearly evident in a recent analysis of items removed from household brown bins. The contents of Brown bins are composted at Lower Polmaise, and the presence of these rogue items could endanger employees, cause damage to expensive equipment and lower the quality of compost produced. Brown bins, collected fortnightly, are only to be used for "green waste" like grass, leaves, small branches and cardboard with tape and staples removed.

Sandy Murphy, Compost Controller at Lower Polmaise, explained: "Residents need to be more vigilant when putting items into their brown bins. Dangerous items are finding their way into brown bins which could get caught in a conveyor belt during processing and could ultimately cause an injury to the operators or damage the shredder."

Due to residents placing non-compostable items into their Brown bins, two large skips

of rejects picked from the contents of Brown bins have to be sent to landfill every week. This costs Stirling Council taxpayers money.

In the months from April 2008, Stirling Council has paid over £17,000 to landfill the 255 tonnes of contaminants from residents' brown bins rejected from the composting process. These costs will continue to rise unless action is taken. David Hopper, Waste Services Manager said: "People who put the wrong items into the Brown bins are responsible for increasing health and safety concerns and potentially endangering operators at the Polmaise. People also need to be aware that recycling incorrectly is costing the Council money to dispose of the items under current environmental legislation. I would like to thank all of the Stirling Council residents who correctly recycle and would urge them to carry on their efforts and spread the word among their neighbours, friends and family on the importance of this message."

Every load of incoming Brown bin material is graded for quality on its arrival at Lower Polmaise. Towns, neighbourhoods and even streets where loads with high levels of

contaminants originate can be identified. These areas are being targeted for increased attention from Waste Awareness and Compliance Officers. If contamination is spotted, bins have a sticker placed on them and subsequently not emptied. Residents are required to remove the contaminants before the next collection to have their bin emptied. Under current legislation, persistent offenders could face a fixed penalty of at least £50 and/or a summary conviction of up to £1,000. For more information please see www.stirling.gov.uk/waste



Two skips per week of costly contaminants are removed from the contents of residential Brown bins at the Lower Polmaise compost facility.

The compost produced as result of Brown bin recycling meets the national quality standard for soil improving compost (PAS 100). This allows the Council to bag the compost as a product (Castle Compost) and make it available to local householders free of charge. To get your free compost, please visit the Lower Polmaise Household Waste Recycling Centre Monday - Sunday - 8.30am - 6.30 pm (last entry at 6.15 pm) until 30 September. There is a limit of two bags Castle Compost available per visit.

Rural Plastic Bottle Recycling – Rinse & Squash

Residents in all Stirling Council rural areas will be able to recycle any type of plastic bottle in their weekly kerbside recycling collection from Monday 15 September.

The main advice for residents presenting bottles for collection is to give them a quick rinse in cold water, then compress the bottle. When it's squashed, put the lid back on if possible to keep the air out. This makes a very big difference in the amounts that can be collected at one time; this is especially relevant for 1-litre and larger plastic bottles.

"This is a welcome expansion of the kerbside recycling opportunities available for Stirling Council residents," said Environment portfolio holder, Cllr Jim Thomson. "Last year we recycled around 40% of our municipal waste, but we still have a long way to go to reach the Scottish Government's new targets of 50% by 2013 increasing to 70% by 2025. Everyone is encouraged to recycle as much as possible, and to use their brown bins for clean cardboard and compostable garden waste." Since 2003, HDPE (high-density polyethylene) milk bottles have been accepted at the kerbside. However, when clear PET (polyethylene terephthalate) juice and water bottles are added to a recycling collection route, it doubles the amount of plastic the crews collect. When squashed, many more plastic bottles will fit in the vehicle.

This collection is only for plastic bottles; other plastics such food packaging, fruit punnets, yoghurt pots, bubble wrap, microwave trays and so on, are not included in this collection and will be left in the box. They may be added to collections at some point in the future.

Have you got what it takes to be a Retained Firefighter?

There is a shortage, at the moment, of people who will turn out and help in an emergency. This is particularly true in villages like Aberfoyle and Doune because nowadays there are fewer people who live and work locally. You might be just the person to fill the gap.

In more rural areas such as Aberfoyle, the station is staffed by people who live in the village and have other jobs such as builders, shopkeepers, farmers or plumbers. When the call comes to attend an incident in the area, they become part of a dedicated team ready to face any emergency.

To apply to join the service you don't need any paper qualifications. You must be at least eighteen at the time of appointment, with good all-round fitness and good eyesight. You will be asked to take a straightforward written, fitness and practical test and undergo a medical.

On average, you will be called out one or two times for a couple of hours. If you cannot be available all the time, that's not a problem. You can be paid for being 'on call' only part of the day or week. There is a shortage of people who are available during midweek working hours, so you could have weekends or evenings free and still do a worthwhile job. If you really can't be on call, for example due to holidays, you can 'sign off'. In addition you will be required to attend a training night once a week.

As well as job satisfaction, you will be trained in the use of equipment. You are paid a basic retainer, a fee for call-outs and another for turning out to a fire or another type of emergency. You are paid for drill nights and duties like equipment maintenance.



I would like to introduce you to our new arrivals in the front field, Jilly and little thin Shanni.

Jilly and Shanni are Arab mares, and they belong to Kath Lyon, the lady who does the duck show at the Scottish Woollen Mill. They arrived here in mid-August, but poor little Shanni had had a very rough time.

Kath had been working here for the summer, and had left her horses in what she thought were capable hands, but word came from a friend who had visited them to say that Shanni was in a sorry state: she had damaged a tendon, and had been kept in a loose box for weeks, separated from her mother and the other horses, without proper care, and without the extra hay needed to replace grass. The stress and lack of nutrition had caused her weight to drop to frightening levels.

Kath immediately came and asked me if I could give her grazing for two horses for five weeks - when I agreed she burst into tears! Transporting horses is expensive; it is to her credit that she brought them here when she will shortly be moving again, at the end of the season.

But now, every time you see her Shanni has great wedges of grass sticking out both sides of her mouth, so she is taking her weight-gain program very seriously! The grass is ideal - not too rich, which would be dangerous for her, and she is hand-fed with concentrates several times a day. We already see a difference in her outline. She won't wear a rug, which would help, she just runs herself ragged trying to shake it off, so the race is on to get her back to condition with a nice thick coat before winter sets in.

I'm sure you'll join me in wishing Kath the best of luck both for herself and her horses in the future. Jilly and Shanni are beautiful creatures, and they will always be welcome here.

From the Manse

Autumn is a poignant time despite its beauty, and this year particularly so, with summer such a fleeting visitor. The harvest is now, I hope, safely gathered in, so it's a time to be thankful, and to remember our oft-forgotten dependence on the land.

At my school harvest assembly, we would lustily sing "We plough the fields and scatter/the good seed on the land", though in London we did little ploughing and even less scattering, at least not the seed variety. We would bring in produce for the service: apples, carrots, plums. One girl brought bananas. Our teacher went bananas, saying icily to her, "Are you, girl, you, who are so hopeless at biology, trying to tell me that you grew these at home?" The rest of us, I remember, scattered in giggles.

There was an article in the papers recently about a woman who can remember every day of her life from the age of six. So, on the 19th April, 2009, she will remember exactly what she was doing on 19th April, 1975, 76, 77, etc. The poor woman is tormented by her memories - she cannot let them go to live her life now.

Then at the other end of the scale are those we weep for, who lose their memory with some form of dementia. Memory is so much part of our humanity. When we remember past events, we re-member them, recreate them, put them together again. Memory makes us who we are now. Sometimes societies have too much memory and cannot forget old feuds and hatreds. Sometimes societies have too little memory, and forget to remember - and learn from - their history.

Soon it will be Remembrance Sunday. Like Harvest Thanksgiving, it's a time to remind us where we come from. Remembrance Sunday has become very real for all of us, with terrifying numbers of young men and women lost in Afghanistan and Iraq. Our ecumenical act of remembrance at the war memorial will be AFTER worship, so that we can remember with dignity, rather than rush to be there on time. It's not the time for remembrance that matters, but that we remember. And in our own lives, we might also

St Mary's Episcopal Church

Two pilgrimages for one purpose.

Mark Seymour is the Lay Chair of St Mary's Vestry and Nick Cooke its Treasurer. Both have been heavily involved for some time now in the planning and the even larger task of fundraising for the £150,000 Renovation Appeal of St Mary's. The hope is that the works planned will preserve the beauty of this place of worship for another generation. Thus far, response to the appeal has been most encouraging, not only because of a large Heritage Lottery Fund grant, but also the singular generosity of St Mary's congregation.

Nick and Mark's contribution to the Appeal has though been far more than administration from a desk. To help raise awareness of the project and hopefully some of the outstanding monies, Mark and Nick recently completed a remarkable and poignant sponsored pilgrimage undertaken solely by foot and ferry to Iona. Following a short service of blessing, the two left St Mary's on the 14th September heading for Inversnaid. Not surprisingly they were accompanied by steady rain, a constant companion throughout the week. Leaving Inversnaid the next morning, the two joined the West Highland Way, and followed it as far as Inverarnan, before a gruelling trek to reach Dalmally before dark. This leg of the journey was some twenty miles. The next day the pair followed the shore of Loch Awe to Taynuilt and by Wednesday had reached Oban to catch the ferry to Craignure on Mull. Having disembarked on Mull, the day finished at Lochdon. The final leg of the journey was completed by crossing the island to Carsaig and thence by ferry to Iona. By the end of the journey nearly a hundred miles had been covered on foot.

So what is a pilgrimage? It is traditionally a journey to a holy place undertaken by the faithful to obtain help or as an act of thanksgiving. In travelling to Iona, Mark and Nick have followed the steps of many faithful over the centuries. It was St Columba who first landed on the Island in 563AD, and shortly after founded a monastery that in time was to become the centre of Celtic Christianity. It was from Iona that missionaries were first sent to Scotland and Northern England.

It is most appropriate that part of the fund raising campaign should be centred on this walk to Iona. However beautiful St Mary's undoubtedly is, we are not striving only to preserve bricks and fabric for the future. Rather we are attempting to play a small part with many others, in the continuation of a faith first brought to this area by the toil and sacrifice of those on Iona.

Once sugar levels have been restored and blisters healed, Nick and Mark plan a second pilgrimage during the first half of next year. They plan this time to strike south from Aberfoyle to eventually reach Whithorn Church on the Galloway Coast, another centre of faith founded by St Ninian. This walk will total some 120 miles.

Should any reader wish to sponsor Mark and Nick for one or both pilgrimages, they may do so via the St Mary's Website. Sponsors can choose to give an amount per mile or a fixed sum per pilgrimage. The Garden

Autumn; We may not have had summer weather since May but, like it or not, autumn is here now. Ask anyone, even a small child, what autumn means. Their first thought will be of leaves changing colour. From bronze, yellow through to the brightest scarlet. Some years we have spectacular displays. Let's hope this is one of those. It may make up for the lack of bright weather.

If you want to plant trees and shrubs to give your garden a firework finale at the end of summer there is no shortage of ideas.

Berberis, Amelanchier, Blueberry, Deciduous Azalia, Chesnut, Beech and Oak. Here are some more suggestions:

For the small garden the Rowan (Sorbus) is the ideal tree. You will have flowers in spring, berries for the birds and vivid colours before the leaves fall. Often overlooked is Sorbus Reducta - good for ground cover.



Japanese Maples (Acer Palmatum) have lovely foliage from spring many turning brilliant colours in autumn. There are a lot of types of Acer's to suit different situations. If you have room for a specimen tree a good choice would be Acer Griseum, the Paper

Barked Maple. Although slow growing it can reach 30ft in height and the same in spread. This tree has fascinating peeling orange

brown bark and will have rich hues of plum and orange to draw the eye at the end of summer.

Something I've just discovered is the Katsura tree

(Cercidiphyllum), a tall elegant bush with small heart shaped leaves that change to gold and pink at this time of year. An extra surprise is the scent of honey or burnt sugar, 'candyfloss' is the way the books describe this wonderful fragrance that hovers around the whole area where it is grown.

Euonymus Alatus is a shrub that should be planted more often. Unlike most other Euonymus this one is deciduous. A few weeks before the leaves drop they turn a brilliant scarlet. The Winged Spindal is another name for this dense shrub. This refers to the branches which have strange ridges along them. On close inspection they remind me of the spines on a crocodile or dragon!

Over the next few weeks, look around this beautiful countryside of ours. See the spectacular autumn displays. You don't have to seek out the unusual or expensive plants to appreciate the rich opulent foliage. Just look at the common Bramble for example !

Hello Children,

I am really looking forward to the Mushroom Festival and all the fun things that will be happening in and around Aberfoyle. At this time of year there are always lots and lots of toadstools growing in Strathard. As if by magic, they seem to spring-up overnight. I like the big, red ones that are covered in tiny white dots. If you keep extremely quiet, and look very carefully, you might just see a faerie sitting on one. It is one of their favourite places to sit and think.

But, if you make the slightest sound, they vanish in an instant.

Other mushrooms are so small you can hardly see them. Last year I went on a Fungus Foray at the David Marshall Lodge, which is a good way to learn about the mushrooms you can eat — and those you must leave alone!! Grandpa Otter has been out picking edible toadstools in the forest with my sister, Braeval, and the twins. I usually go, too. But this year George the Hare came with some exciting news, a horse chestnut tree with lots of conkers: big conkers. Most of the conkers this year are rather on the small side so to come across a tree with big conkers was a bit of good fortune, indeed. I like to find the biggest possible conker for the conker championship. Dad had to show the twins, Duke and Katrine, how to thread a conker onto a piece of string about 30cm long. Remember to tie a knot at the end to stop the conker falling off. And take care when drilling the hole from the top to the bottom of your conker. Then two people take turns in trying to smash their opponent's conker with their own. Yes, knuckles do get bashed, but it is a lot of fun.

When the leaves on the trees begin to change colour, taking on shades of gold, orange and red, the nights become suddenly darker and the stars shine much more brightly. Providing it is not too cloudy. If you gaze up into the heavens, it will not be long before you will see what looks like a bright star moving slowly across the sky. The Oran Mor

No, we are not being maudlin here, merely by use of exaggeration describing venues or places which our readers might find enjoyable, away from bonny Strathard. With that target in mind, yet again your team from the Strathard News has been on the march, by car, searching out the places best to visit, sights best to see. I could go on, but I'm sure you have the drift. On this occasion we are going away from the countryside to visit the big city, to wit, Glasgow, and to the theatre. Nowt like a bit o' culture, I can hear you say!

So in search of this elusive thing called 'culture' I took 'Er Indoors' to Glasgow's West End. Now this area of the big city could not be considered as one of my favourite haunts by any means being what I consider to be a bit 'ponsyfied', though to be fair the area does have some great second hand book shops and record stores. It was billed as a comedy and got rave reviews, so we went.

The small theatre was mobbed and all the punters friendly and chatty. You took your choice of food, pie or quiche, a pint or glass of wine. I can only assume the idea was the men had the pie and pint, the ladies

SRDP Green Light For IT & Web Training Initiative To Help Forth Valley Farmers

Stirling Enterprise (STEP) has been given the green light by Scottish Government to deliver a year-long IT and Web Outreach initiative, aimed specifically at farmers in the Forth Valley area.

The local enterprise trust, which also deliver Business Gateway services in the Stirling District area, has secured £18,450 of funding from the Skills Development Scheme (SDS) which falls under the Scottish Rural Development Programme (SRDP) umbrella.

STEP itself will contribute a percentage to the total running cost of the programme, with participants contributing a small nominal fee to secure a workshop place. The first of a series of ten planned mobile workshops will hit the road in late November in Drymen, equipping local farmers and their families with the IT know-how and web provision to access and negotiate the SRDP website and confidently tackle the on-line application process.

More crucially, the outreach workshops will allow local farmers access to two-hours worth of IT and Broadband provision and an IT professional.

The workshops will be held in local hotels in the Stirling, Clackmannan and Falkirk area in an evening format and participants will be have the option of a one-hour individual follow-up support session to consolidate or refresh their knowledge.

Caroline Brown, Rural & Farm Support Officer for Stirling Enterprise (STEP) commented:

"We are delighted to have secured this funding and are keen to get out on the road and meet with local farmers and start

delivering the training as opposed to talking about it. Through our Business Gateway activity, we already have good links with farm businesses in the area and we have been working closely with NFU Scotland and SAC to extend and develop that.

"As an addendum to our current Business Gateway contract, we were awarded funding to raise awareness of SRDP and the opportunities within it for farms and rural businesses across Forth Valley. We have been actively doing this and have seen first hand the difficulties that applicants are encountering along the way. We will now also be able to link clients attending this new web training into relevant Business Gateway services so as to maximise benefits."

Stirling Enterprise (STEP) has a joint event with NFU Scotland and SAC Stirling planned for the evening of Wed, 22nd October at Stirling Enterprise Park, Stirling. The event will look at the overall picture of SRDP and how applicants can best tackle the online application process. Information on the scoring system used by Case Workers to process applications will also be available.

Caroline continued: "This event will provide the ideal platform to roll out the first half of our planned schedule of IT & Web outreach workshops."

Charles Allan MacIntyre – Almac

21 June 1948 -18 July 2008

The jam jars lie empty on the windowsill. No car in the Main Street flies the saltire. No solitary drinker huddles against the weather on the terrace of the Forth Inn. Aberfoyle has lost one of its originals. Patriot, philosopher, poet, raconteur, mine host, mountaineer and jam maker extraordinaire, Almac had an even wider field of knowledge. I was proud to be his friend. When Allan exchanged computers for a career as a publican, he transformed the Trossachs Inn into a thriving, entertaining pub. His Trossachs Olympics were legendary, and raised funds for Lomond Mountain Rescue. 'Young Turks' boasting of their climbing exploits would be invited to attempt the ceiling level obstacle course or the greasy poll. Few succeeded and Mountain Rescue Funds benefited.

On one occasion, Almac invited Hamish the famous Highland bull into the pub for a pint. Startled by flash photography, Hamish promptly deposited a large contribution of steaming manure on the pub floor. The Trossachs Inn's proximity to the River Forth, led Almac to become an expert at predicting water levels during floods by consulting the tide charts. He didn't always get it right!

Almac was his own man. He did not hesitate to risk the wrath of officials by breaking rules if his generosity deemed it appropriate. When, for example, a scout troop arrived late and found the gates of a campsite shut, Almac invited them to camp overnight in the grounds of the pub. A complaint ensued.

For such an active man, ill health was a ball and chain, heavy to bear. To add insult to injury, the smoking ban left him feeling like a pariah as he stubbornly braved Aberfoyle weather on the terrace of the Forth Inn.

Almac, I miss you. Marion, my thoughts are with you, Ross and the family.



Cannon of Pork topped with Mushroom and Smoked Bacon Mousse

INGREDIENTS:

1 Small chicken breast
1 egg white
½ pint double cream
1 rasher bacon
2 small mushrooms
2 portion pork cannon



METHOD:

Put the chicken in a food processor and blend. Add the egg white and blend again. Take out and place in a bowl, season with salt and white pepper. Trim the fat off the bacon and cut into thin strips, slice the mushrooms and fry together. Place in a strainer until cool. Slowly add a little cream to the chicken and stir in (do not over beat), when almost all the cream is added. Add the bacon and mushrooms and mix. Drop a little of the mix in a pan of boiling water, take out when cooked and check for seasoning. Lie the pork on its side and top with the mix. Wrap tightly in cling film and then in tin foil. Place in a hot oven and cook for approx 20 mins. Take out of the cling film and serve. Pork is best served a little pink, but ensure the mousse is fully cooked!

Motorists in the UK could save more than £100 million a year if they switch to independent garages for servicing, new Government figures show. But the Office of Fair Trading (OFT) says 86% per cent of business still goes to franchised dealers, despite new rules letting owners get work done outside the network without invalidating the warranty. A new OFT report says the average bill is 40 per cent cheaper at an independent garage but only 14% of owners took advantage of this. Those who left the dealer network in the two years after the warranty servicing rules were changed in 2003 collectively saved £30 million. But if every driver had followed suit, this could have been £214 million - or £107 million a year.
